Per Diem Rates for FY2013

The continental United States (CONUS) per diem rates are set by the General Services Administration (GSA) each year for the upcoming federal fiscal year (October 1 through September 30). The State of Tennessee and many counties in Tennessee have adopted these rates for reimbursement for meals and lodging travel expenses. The rates for the 2013 fiscal year are the same rates for the 2012 year. The rates for travel in Tennessee are in the schedule below. Info to Know: Strip Searches in Jails

In Florence v. Board of Chosen Freeholders of the County of Burlington, 132 S.Ct. 1510 (2012), the United States Supreme Court examined whether or not jail deputies can strip search all persons to be booked into the jail's general population no matter how minor the offense and without reasonable suspicion to believe they were hiding contraband or weapons. The Court upheld the blanket strip search policy at issue. The Court noted that this was not a case where jail officers intentionally humiliated a prisoner, it was not a case involving touching, and it was not a case where the prisoner was held for a short period of time without ever being placed in general population.

This case completely revises the federal standard for conducting jail strip searches. Nevertheless, in Tennessee, state law must still be followed. Tennessee Code Annotated section 40-7-119 defines strip search as "having an arrested person remove or arrange some or all of the person's clothing so as to permit a visual inspection of the genitals, buttocks, anus, female breasts or undergarments of the person." Pursuant to T.C.A. § 40-17-119, "[n]o person arrested for a traffic, regulatory or misdemeanor offense, except in cases involving weapons or a controlled substance, shall be strip searched unless there is reasonable belief that the individual is concealing a weapon, a controlled substance or other contraband."

Until Tennessee state law is changed, Tennessee sheriffs must continue to follow the current statute when conducting strip searches in the county jail.
